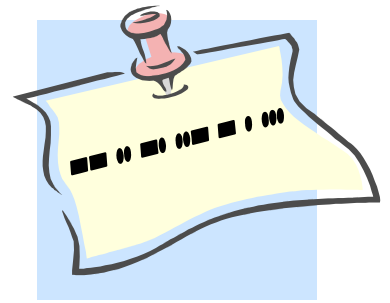

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# 2007 Technician Licensing Class Successfully Concludes

After a brief period of hesitancy and uncertainty the annual Amateur Radio Licensing Class got underway on March 10<sup>th</sup>. This year the approach was similar to the method successfully used for the licensing classes conducted in 2001-2003. This method relies upon multiple “instructors” or facilitators and is predicated on the concept that the “student” is responsible for reading the material in the license manual prior to each class session when the material will be reviewed, discussed and questions answered. Using multiple instructors provides the students with exposure to the various interests we share within the exciting world of amateur radio. This year we had volunteer instructors whose interests included emergency communications, operating CW, operating PSK-31, SSTV, contesting, DXing, experimenting with antennas, message handling, and kit building to mention a few.

We had nine students initially show up including the two Science Fair winners. Over the course of the next ten weeks the students learned about amateur radio and what it takes to earn an Amateur Radio license. Unfortunately, during the course of the class, one the students had to drop out.

May 12<sup>th</sup> was a big day for the class as it was the last class session. It was big also because the students would be given their license exams shortly after the session concluded. Prior to the end of the class, the students reviewed portions of the question pool and took two practice exams. Everyone appeared to ready for the “final exam”.

After an hour or so, the big moment arrived. All of the students passed. A couple of them needed another “practice exam” but they all earned a license at the end of the day. All of the students received a free membership in AARC through the end of the year. Congratulations to:

## Dayton 2007

This year marked the 9<sup>th</sup> consecutive year I've attended the Dayton Hamvention<sup>®</sup> which is not a record by any means. I only mention this as a lead-in to how each visit is different. In the past, I've driven to Dayton. Sometimes we stopped along the way but on most occasions we drove on through.

It's a fairly easy drive – Take I-70 to I-68 to I-79 North to I-70 thus avoiding the PA Turnpike. From my QTH to the Dayton Hamvention<sup>®</sup> it is 506 miles or a 7 hour 43 minute drive. Of course that is a bit misleading because you're most likely going to stay at a hotel not adjacent to the Hara Arena and you'll probably stop for gas and a bite to eat. So figure on a drive of about 8 ½ - 9 hrs and your mileage will still be close to 500 miles but who's counting? After all, it's Dayton!!

About 5 hours into your drive (315-320 miles) you'll enter the dreaded buckeye state (Go Blue!) and at the 2<sup>nd</sup> exit you'll find a Cracker Barrel restaurant. This is a great place to sit down to relax, enjoy a nice meal and refuel the car. From there it is about 3 ½ hours to Dayton. Drive through Columbus rather than going around their beltway. There is nothing significant about Columbus so don't worry about stopping there unless nature calls.

Some of you may recall my earlier stories about the adventures of AARC Jr on the way to Dayton. The infamous "Barbiemobile" which ran out fuel because of a defective transfer valve, then the tail pipe came off, and then there was the smoke filled driving compartment followed by the shredding of the serpentine belt. The next year, the convoy got split up and everybody missed one vehicle which left an hour later than the rest but got to Dayton about an hour earlier than everyone. Another year one of the vehicles in the convoy encountered "bad gas" which was a euphemism for a blown cylinder. I think that was the same year we drove the last two hours in a torrential downpour during which you could barely see the front end of your car at 75 MPH.

The past two years, we've flown to Dayton. About \$49-\$59 one way. Rental car is about \$19 per day plus gas. It takes about 1 hour and 20 minutes to fly from BWI to Dayton. It sure beats the 8-9 hr drive and reduces the wear and tear on your car. The drawback to this is that you can't carry a lot back home with you on the plane and so you have to ship your major purchases. Thankfully, UPS is alive and well at the Hamvention<sup>®</sup>.

Every year the same stuff is there as are the usual suspects. Or most of it anyway. There are some new things to be fair. The non-ham stuff vendors are still visible. Shoe inserts, massage therapy, lighted gizmos, computer stuff, etc. The core vendors are always there – HRO, MFJ, Icom, Yaesu, Kenwood, Alinco, TenTec, Elecraft, Alpha Power, the Signman of Baton Rouge, ARRL, etc.

Many of the usual outside tailgaters and vendors are present every year as well as those folks who rather than having a yard sale at home, load everything into a truck or trailer and try to off-load on you at Dayton. I love the smell of the bratwurst cooking in the morning as I walk through the outside area looking for that hard-to-find, got-to-have and can't-live-without piece of junk.

Then there are the forums where you can hear people talk at length about a variety of subjects near and dear to their heart. Maybe it's near and dear to your heart too. In my case, mostly it's not. That's

not to say I don't enjoy some of the forums because I do. I especially enjoy the Youth in Amateur Radio Forum during which licensed youth (under 18 years old) get up and speak about their

involvement or experience in some aspect of amateur radio. Every year I am amazed at how polished these kids (10-14 yrs old on average I suppose) are when they stand up in front of a crowd of 200-250 people crammed into the smallest room available (the idiots in charge haven't figured out that this forum is the only forum that consistently overflows its assigned room.) and give a presentation that will knock your socks off. Their enthusiasm, courage and professionalism are just amazing.

Then there is the Hamvention<sup>®</sup> food. Don't eat the stuff inside! Only eat the food you see them actually cook on a grill outside. Even if it's road kill. You have no idea what's in those hotdogs they sell inside or how old they are. Rumor has it that the leftover hotdogs are like the holiday fruitcake that is recycled as a gift to a different person every year. The ice cream on a stick was pretty good.

Then there are the people – common folks and the luminaries. I try to avoid the “luminaries” as they seem, for the most part, all about themselves. In my humble opinion, there are a ton of amateurs who attend the Hamvention<sup>®</sup> who have made as many and in most cases, more important contributions to our hobby at the local level but don't get the recognition they truly deserve.

Here's this year's Hamvention<sup>®</sup> story:

Brenda, Ryan and I volunteered to help out during one of the three VE sessions being conducted during the Hamvention<sup>®</sup>. On Friday we stopped by to introduce ourselves to the VE Team Leader.

A young boy named John came out of the test session with his dad. I asked John if he had passed and he politely informed me that he had, and that he had only missed one question. John, by the way is only 7 yrs old. His dad also took the Technician exam but he missed two questions. In discussing the exam results and the Hamvention<sup>®</sup> we realized that John and his dad thought the vendors were limited to the Hara Arena (the hockey rink) and didn't realize there were 4-5 other rooms. So we took them on a tour.

We showed them where the Youth Forum would be held the next day, where call sign hats were made, the ARRL Expo – John got to meet Bill McArthur (KC5ACR) who is also an astronaut. Bill autographed John's CSCE (KC5ACR/NA1SS) and when it was explained that Bill had operated from the International Space Station, John was all excited about making a contact with the station right then and now. John also picked up some freebies as we guided him and his dad around.

At every stop we explained that John was 7 yrs old and missed only one question on his exam. We took him to visit Gordon West who made a spectacular show of recognizing the accomplishments of John and his dad. Way to go Gordo!

Later that night John and his dad got their license and call sign granted (This year's exams were done by the Laurel VEC VE Team in Dayton which was free and the people who tested on Friday had their upgrade or new call in the FCC Data Base later that night. The folks who tested on Saturday saw their upgrades and new calls in the FCC Data Base Monday morning). John's call is KD8GHH and his dad's call is KD8GHI. I'm told that John was seen wearing his new call sign hat on Saturday. I'm sorry I missed seeing that.

Every year the Dayton Hamvention<sup>®</sup> is the same. And every year it's different. Anyway you look at it, it's fun and well worth the trip. You'll be surprised at the people you'll see there or staying at your hotel.

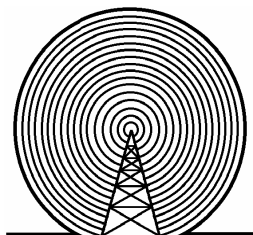
